

LEGISLATIVE PACKAGE AND FINAL DEAL COMPARISON

Re-Opening Grants and Expanded Learning Opportunities Grants as a comprehensive package

- The sum of \$2 billion one-time Proposition 98 General Fund is available for In-Person Instruction Grants as an add-on for those that meet eligibility requirements.
- The sum of \$4.6 billion one-time Proposition 98 General Fund is available for all districts to support expanded learning.
- Public school districts will receive grants as follows (non-classroom based charter schools are not eligible for the re-opening grants).

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Vaccines	Requires county public health departments to make COVID-19 vaccines available to school site personnel who are working at a school site where pupils are attending in person. Set aside (codified) ten percent of first doses statewide to education workers – approximately 75,000 vaccines per week. Consistent with Governor's February announcement.	
Other			Provides \$30 million in one-time funding to increase staffing and capacity for safety enforcement and technical assistance, subject to expenditure plan and Joint Legislative Budget Committee approval.
