PROPOSITION 98

- Proposes \$102 billion for the Prop. 98 guarantee
- Represents \$8.2 billion increase over last year's enacted budget
- \$15,261 per pupil

PROP 98: HIGHEST PER PUPIL SPENDING EVER



LOCAL CONTROL FUNDING FORMULA (LCFF)

- 5.33% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA)
- Increase of \$3.3 billion to LCFF
- Highest COLA since the Great Recession

K-12 CATEGORICAL PROGRAMS

- 5.33% cost-of-living adjustment (COLA)
- Approximately \$295 million for various K-12 categorical programs outside of LCFF including special education

LOCAL RESERVE CAP TRIGGERED

- Proposal includes \$3.1 billion in payments to the Public School System Stabilization Account (Prop. 98 Rainy Day Fund)
- Well over the threshold to trigger a 10% cap on local district reserves
- Reserve cap will go into effect in the 2022-23 year

COVID RELIEF

- \$2.7 billion proposed w/ \$1.4 billion for emergency allocations
- Focus on bolstering testing, accelerating vaccination and booster efforts, supporting frontline workers and the health care systems, and battling misinformation
- Includes the distribution of antigen tests to schools already underway

DECLINING ENROLLMENT

 Governor proposes to mitigate fiscal instability by allowing Local Education Agencies (LEAs) to calculate ADA using current year, prior year, or an average of three prior year's ADA

INDEPENDENT STUDY

- Virtual education via independent study will continue to be an option in 2022-2023
- Some additional flexibilities added

UNIVERSAL TRANSITIONAL KINDERGARTEN

- \$639.2 million to fund first year implementation of UTK
- These funds will increase through the rebenching of Prop 98
- \$383 million is proposed to add one additional staff person to every TK class

EXPANDED LEARNING OPPORTUNITY GRANTS

- \$3.4 billion ongoing Prop 98 funds for ELO-P
- \$937 million one-time fund to support ELO-P infrastructure, with a focus on integrating arts and music programming into enrichment options
- Continued one-time reimbursement rate increases from the 2021 Budget Act for ASES and 21st CCLC programs

SPECIAL EDUCATION

Invest \$500 million into the AB 602 formula coupled with the following policy changes:

- Calculate special education base funding at the LEA level, rather than the SELPA level
- Allocate Educationally-Related Mental Health Services funding directly to LEAs
- Consolidate the two special education extraordinary cost pools into a single pool
- Develop a Special Education Addendum to the LCAP

FACILITIES & TRANSPORTATION

- More than \$2 billion General Fund for modernization and new construction through School Facility Program over two years
- Allocation of remaining Proposition 51 (facility bond) funds to support school construction projects totaling \$1.4 billion
- \$1.5 billion over three years to support school transportation programs, with a focus on greening bus fleets. Grants of \$500,000 will be available for electric buses and charging equipment.

NUTRITION

- \$596 million to fund universal school meals
- \$450 million one-time funds to upgrade kitchen infrastructure
- \$3 million one-time funds to support School Breakfast and Summer Meal Start-Up and Expansion Grant Program

EDUCATOR RECRUITMENT & RETENTION

- Provides \$24 million General Fund to waive teacher examination fees
- Provides \$12 million General Fund to extend credential fee waivers
- Extends the ability of LEAs to utilize substitute teachers for up to 60 cumulative days for another year
